(45 min)	<ul> <li>Notes:</li> <li>PAX institute is a good behavior game that shows children self-regulation. Teachers can use it to teach students self-regulation.</li> <li>They want to work with anyone who is in an early childhood environment. It is a good behavior game that is a set of research-based strategies that teachers can use to teach self-regulation.</li> <li>This self-regulation creates more nurturing classroom environments, increased academic performance, and improved long term outcomes. Also allows teacher an average extra 90 minutes of teach time that they typically lose to behaviors and transitions in their day.</li> <li>Goal is to have students thrive and not just survive each day in the classroom.</li> <li>PAX ensures that in everything they do the children are in charge of their environment to help increase psychological safety and the ability to think.</li> <li>Uses trauma informed strategies in the classroom to teach behavior and self-regulation as a skillset.</li> <li>When PAX comes out they provide every trained teacher with a complete PAX GBG Teacher kit and PAX Up! App with impact data reporting system.</li> <li>The training is free and provides you with everything you need to implement.</li> <li>Gives children a voice for what they want and expect in their classroom when it comes to how to treat one another.</li> <li>Maybe coaches become PAX partners who go into classrooms and model strategies and such?</li> <li>Huge difference in behaviors in the classroom in just 3 months once PAX is implemented.</li> <li>Shows long term benefits in reading for children and other academics including test scores.</li> </ul>	



	<ul> <li>Improved teacher wellbeing-After 5 months of PAX implementation teachers showed a drastic drop in stress and turn over</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Improved student mental health-Improvements after 1 semester of implementing PAX GBG</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Long term impact- giving children a way to cope rather than turning to drugs and alcohol and things like that. Fewer students will experiment with or develop addiction to illicit drugs and negative self-talk.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Fewer students will require referral for special education services and mental health referrals</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Fewer boys will develop conduct disorders after 5 years, and even after 10 years</li> </ul>
